MEMBERS APPOINT 2024 DIRECTORS

Our Annual General Meeting (AGM) was held on Saturday, June 29, 2024. Members gathered to review the annual report for 2023 and elect new board directors for TIPNG. TIPNG's board is comprised of 15 voluntary directors that provide guidance to the operations of the organisation.

Mr. Peter Aitsi was re-elected as Chairperson, demonstrating the continued confidence of TIPNG members in his leadership. Mrs. Stephannie Kirriwom-Sawong was elected Secretary of the Board, bringing her valuable expertise to the organization.

Eight directors were also elected at the AGM to serve on the Board: Jerome Sesega, Mary Udu, Evah Kuamin, Richard Kassman, William Koregai, Paul Barker, Christopher Elphick, Bill Doa-Neill, and Michael McWalter.

In welcoming the 2024 Board members, Chairman Peter Aitsi expressed his anticipation for their active engagement and contributions.

Given the current environment of impunity for corruption and declining public trust in state institutions, the Board's focus on strategic leadership is more crucial than ever. Mr. Aitsi outlined the Board's key priorities, including advocacy for electoral reform and continued engagement through initiatives like the Youth Against Corruption Association and the Community Coalition Against Corruption.

TIPNG's Strategic Plan 2024-2028 sets a new course for the organization, aiming to empower like-minded individuals and organizations while driving collective action against corruption.

The role of a TIPNG director is voluntary, and the Board is responsible for setting the organization's vision, managing its finances, ensuring statutory compliance, and overseeing its overall performance.

Following the AGM and in accordance with TIPNG's Rules of Association, the elected board appointed two additional directors, Shane Kennedy and Michelle Hauófa, with Michelle taking on the role of Board Treasurer.

PROFESSIONAL COURSE FOR ANTI-CORRUPTION LEADERS

Our Coalitions Engagement Lead, Mrs Barbra Kunai was selected in April 2024 to participate in the Integrity Professional Foundations course, a part of the Enhanced Training Programme for Early Career Integrity Professionals in the Pacific facilitated by Griffith University, Australia and sponsored by the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC).

This comprehensive course is designed to equip participants with the essential skills and knowledge needed to excel in the field of integrity, accountability, and anti-corruption. By delving into organizational functions, operational needs, and the legal, political, and policy contexts relevant to your role, participants will be well-prepared to contribute to the strengthening the integrity systems of their country.

Key benefits of the course include:

- A prestigious Griffith University Digital Badge micro-credential upon successful completion
- Potential recognition as a Griffith University 10 credit point course at AQF8 level
- Opportunities for networking and collaboration with other integrity professionals

The course was delivered between April and August 2024 in Port Moresby, Honiara, Brisbane, and also online.

TIPNG was privileged to have been invited to present on the PNG National Integrity System Assessment during the course session in Port Moresby in May. This opportunity allowed us to share our insights and experiences with participants, contributing to a deeper understanding of the challenges and opportunities facing integrity professionals in PNG.

Organizations from Papua New Guinea that were represented through participation were: PNG Independent Commission Against Corruption, Bank of PNG, Public Prosecutors Office, TIPNG. Other participants were from organisations in the Solomon Islands.

LACK OF TRANSPARENCY IN NATIONAL GOLD CORPORATION BILL

Our media statement emphasized the points that other stakeholders also shared: the importance of transparency in matters concerning Papua New Guinea's valuable natural resources.

The National Gold Corporation Bill has significant implications for the future of the country's gold industry, and the public deserves a clear understanding of its contents and potential impacts.

We called upon relevant state agencies to act in the public interest by conducting a thorough review of the Bill through recognized forums like the PNG Extractives Industries Transparency Initiative (PNGEITI). Independent advice from experts was crucial before the Bill is enacted. Failure to conduct a thorough review could further erode public trust and damage national integrity systems.

We urged the government to withdraw the Bill entirely if it is found to be detrimental to national interests or prone to corruption. However, following much public outcry, the National Gold Corporate Bill has now been shelved.

At TIPNG we remain committed to promoting transparency and integrity in the management of Papua New Guinea's natural resources.

In the second quarter, we released a media statement strongly condemning the lack of transparency surrounding the proposed National Gold Corporation Bill.

Our statement expressed concerns about the rushed nature of the Bill, which was introduced without sufficient public consultation. We highlighted the potential for corruption due to the secrecy surrounding the Shareholder Agreement between the State and a private entity.

The commercial value of the agreement was questionable and appeared to favor private investors. A key point we raised was that: "If the deal was so beneficial, why does it require state guarantees and public funding?"

TRAINING ON ANTI-CORRUPTION POLICIES

We were pleased to participate in a training on developing, implementing, and evaluating national anti-corruption policies and action plans. Organized by UNDP in April 2024, the training brought together key stakeholders from government, civil society, and the private sector.

The training focused on international standards for effective anti-corruption strategies and action plans. Participants discussed the importance of inclusive stakeholder

engagement and the potential consequences of ineffective implementation. TIPNG's participation in this training aligns with our commitment to strengthening national integrity systems. We believe that the National Anti-Corruption Plan of Action (NACPA) is a vital tool for combating corruption in Papua New Guinea. By working with other agencies and stakeholders, we can ensure that the NACPA is effectively implemented and optimized to address the country's specific needs.

CCAC PRIORITIZES PUBLIC FUNDS AND TRANSPARENCY

The Community Coalition Against Corruption (CCAC) has reaffirmed its commitment to fighting corruption in Papua New Guinea. During their first steering committee meeting in April 2024, held in Port Moresby, the CCAC identified key areas of focus including greater media freedom and Improved accountability of public funds - this includes ensuring transparent distribution of funds through the District Services Improvement Program (DSIP) and public procurement processes.

The CCAC Steering Committee was appointed following a National Meeting in Lae, Morobe Province in April 2023. The meeting was attended by 46 community-based organizations and industry representatives, including the Trade Union Congress and the media, and 18 members of the Lae Chamber of Commerce & Industry representing the business sector. Participants came from all regions of Papua New Guinea.

The Steering Committee was tasked with developing a work program that can trigger action to progress the priority areas identified by the Community Coalition Against Corruption in the National Meeting.

Key Areas of Focus:

- Ensuring free and fair elections
- Holding public officials accountable
- Protecting media freedoms
- Promoting transparency in public procurement and land management
- Ensuring proper reporting on the use of DSIP funds.

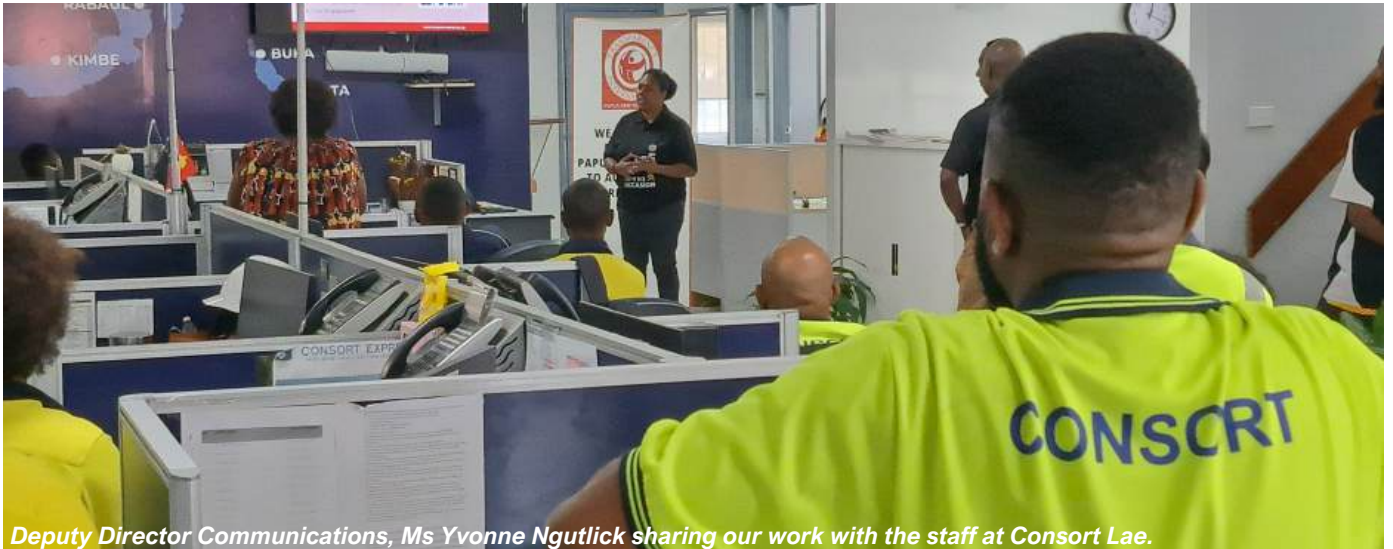

The 2024 Sir Anthony Siaguru Walk Against Corruption

The 2024 Sir Anthony Siaguru Was Against Corruption held on 16 June 2024 was a success. Held simultaneously in Lae and Port Moresby, the event saw a remarkable turnout of participants.

A total of 108 corporate and government teams, 17 Civil Society Organizations, 69 schools, and 38 families joined the walk, demonstrating their unwavering commitment to the cause. Through their generous contributions, TIPNG raised a substantial K226,500, which will be used to fund our ongoing efforts to promote transparency and accountability.

"We are incredibly grateful to everyone who participated in SASWAC 2024," said Ms Arianne Kassman, TIPNG CEO. "Your support has not only helped us financially but has also sent a strong message that corruption will not be tolerated."

The theme of this year's walk, "Rise to the Occasion," encouraged all Papua New Guineans to take action and play their part in combating corruption.

SASWAC, which began in 2007, is TIPNG's flagship fundraising event. The walk serves as a platform to raise funds, increase awareness about corruption, and provide citizens with a peaceful outlet to express their opposition to this pervasive issue.

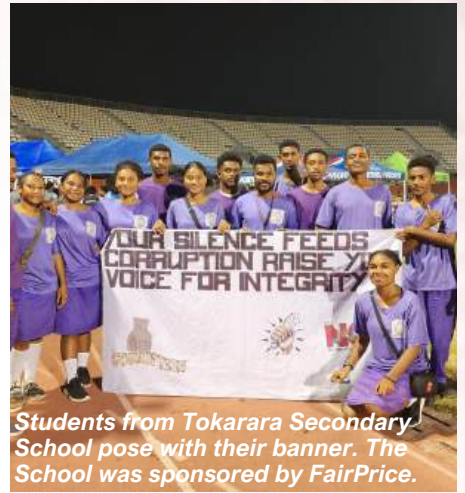

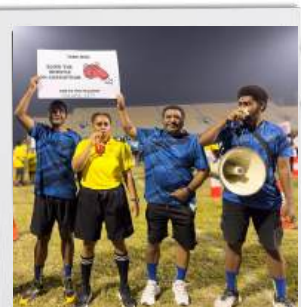

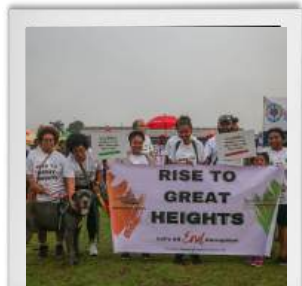

MIKE MANNING YOUTH DEMOCRACY CAMP RETURNS

The 12th Mike Manning Youth Democracy Camp (MMYDC) commenced at the back end of this quarter (June). The ten-day event provided participants with hands-on experience in democratic principles and good governance, including conducting elections, drafting laws, and understanding human rights and budget tracking.

The camp was scheduled to be held in January, but due to the riots in Port Moresby, had to be pushed back to June. Twenty-nine young people from schools across the nation were nominated and selected to participate in the Camp.

The 2024 MMYDC was supported by the US Embassy, ExxonMobil PNG, and the UNDP.
