PREPARING YOUNG VOTERS FOR THE 2027 NGE

As Papua New Guinea prepares for upcoming electoral activities, educating and engaging young voters remains a national imperative. Through the Youth Against Corruption Association (YACA) we joined forces with the PNG Electoral Commission (PNGEC) and the Youth in Elections PNG to host a YACA Forum focused preparing young voters for the National General elections and what they need to know about getting enrolled to vote and how to vote.

Bringing together young leaders, students, and youth advocates, the forum served as an interactive platform to demystify the electoral system, promote voter registration, and highlight the critical role young people play in defending integrity at the ballot box.

Over 100 students from 7 different schools engaged in this forum:

- Jubilee Catholic Secondary School
- Marianville Secondary School
- Tokarara Secondary School
- La Salle Technical Secondary School
- De La Salle Secondary School
- Gerehu Secondary school and
- Sogeri National School of Excellence.

Key highlights from the Forum

- **Understanding the Process:** PNGEC's NCD Election Manager, Mr Roney Hawengao, provided participants with detailed insights into electoral operations, voter roll enrolment, verification procedures, and the step-by-step mechanics of the voting system.
- **Voting as a Civic Duty:** Mr Hawengao emphasized that youth participation goes beyond marking a ballot—it requires making informed, independent choices free from intimidation, bribery, or political pressure.
- **Active Citizen Oversight:** Participants discussed practical ways young citizens can monitor electoral processes, report irregularities through safe channels, and encourage peaceful, transparent participation within their local communities.

Through initiatives like YACA, TIPNG is committed to ensuring young Papua New Guineans transition from passive observers to active, informed participants in our democracy. By equipping youth with a clear understanding of their legal rights and the tools to recognize electoral misconduct, the forum laid a strong foundation for a more transparent and accountable electoral future.

Marking the end of Q2 2026, I reflect with satisfaction on our collective efforts to advance transparency and accountability across Papua New Guinea. From strong community engagement to historic policy achievements, this period has further strengthened the integrity network that drives our work forward.

The quarter was anchored by the success of the 16th Sir Anthony Siaguru Walk Against Corruption (SASWAC), held on June 21, 2026. Under the theme of “Integrity & Action Now!”, 190 teams converged at the Sir John Guise Stadium, raising K208,000 to fuel support for our work.

In the policy space, we reached a landmark achievement with the official validation of the National Right to Information (RTI) Policy on June 11, 2026. This framework, which TIPNG has championed since 1997, is now ready for National Executive Council (NEC) submission, marking an important step toward securing every citizen’s constitutional right under Section 51.

As we look toward the 2027 elections, we remain vigilant. Our recently released 2025 Enabling Environment Country Focus Report warns that civic space is under increasing pressure, making our collective voice more essential than ever.

I would like to express my sincere gratitude to our financial members for their continued support. Your contributions have been instrumental in enabling us to achieve our goals.

STRENGTHENING PACIFIC SOLIDARITY

In April, our Deputy Director Communications Yvonne Ngutlick and Coalitions Engagement Lead Barbra Kunai, joined sister TI Pacific Chapters in Fiji for the TI Pacific Leadership and Advocacy Strategy meeting. The three-day meeting focused on building a stronger, more coordinated, and influential anti-corruption voice across the Pacific region.

A major highlight of the gathering was TIPNG’s participation in a high-level Pacific Regional Stakeholder panel alongside key regional partners, including the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC), the TI Secretariat, and the University of the South Pacific (USP) Journalism Program.

During the panel, TIPNG demonstrated how evidence-based advocacy drives meaningful national reform. Rather than simply reacting to issues as they arise, TIPNG has positioned itself as a thought leader—actively shaping the national narrative by leveraging data to fuel strategic advocacy.

This proactive, evidence-led approach is embedded across TIPNG’s core initiatives:

- The Corruption Perceptions Index (CPI): Translating global data into targeted, local anti-corruption action.
- The Accountability Scorecard: Partnering with the Auditor General’s Office to track and measure public sector performance.
- Electoral Reform: Driving systemic integrity through rigorous Election Observation Reports.

By grounding key messaging in hard evidence, TIPNG ensures it remains a credible and powerful force for integrity—not only within Papua New Guinea, but across the wider Pacific region

YACA EXPANDS SCHOOL OUTREACH

Real and lasting transformation takes root when young people realize that their voices and choices matter. This quarter, through the Youth Against Corruption Association (YACA) initiative, we expanded direct engagement with secondary and vocational schools across Port Moresby, embedding the core principles of Honesty, Integrity, and Good Citizenship into daily student life. By taking our core message directly into student assemblies, TIPNG challenges the next generation to step off the sidelines of governance and embrace their responsibility as active, ethical change-makers.

Fostering Peer Leadership at Port Moresby Grammar School

Continuing this momentum in June, Brian Singut conducted an outreach session at Port Moresby Grammar School. Rather than remaining passive spectators to unethical behavior, students were challenged to actively reject practices like nepotism and favor-seeking.

Students were urged to set a new benchmark for integrity among their peers and within their broader communities. To conclude the session, students recited the YACA Affirmation—a foundational pledge of ethical conduct first established in 2002 by YACA founder, the late Fr. John Glynn.

Limana Vocational Training Center

In May, the YACA team visited Limana Vocational Training Center to talk with students about how corruption hurts the job market they are about to enter. The discussion focused on why paying for fake grades or qualifications is unfair to hardworking people and lowers overall job standards. The YACA team reminded students that while corruption in the country is a big problem, each person has full control over their own choices—and true leadership starts with choosing to be honest, even when no one is watching.



YOUTH IN ELECTIONS TWG PREPARES FOR NGE 2027

At TIPNG, we believe that a robust democracy relies on active, informed citizens who understand their rights and exercise their vote with integrity. Equipping young Papua New Guineans with the knowledge and tools to participate meaningfully in governance is central to building a transparent and accountable nation.

In this quarter, the Youth in Elections Technical Working Group (TWG) convened its fourth meeting, hosting 13 representatives from 7 key stakeholder organizations:

- PNG Electoral Commission (PNGEC)
- National Youth Development Authority
- Equal Playing Field, Art Activism PNG
- Young Port Moresby Chamber of Commerce and Industry
- Young Professional Women's Network
- The Voice Inc.
- TIPNG

The meeting highlighted the growing momentum of inter-agency collaboration ahead of the 2027 National General Election.

Chaired by Ms. Renee Marru of Equal Playing Field, the committee formally adjusted its voter education and enrolment rollout schedule to align directly with the PNGEC's upcoming national timeline.

- A Unified Workplan: With its workplan formally adopted, the coalition is set to launch a national campaign ensuring young voters are enrolled, informed, and equipped to champion fair and transparent elections.

Key Takeaways from the Webinar discussion

Digital Rights as a Civic Duty: Cybersecurity is no longer confined to technical IT departments—it is a critical frontline defense for our public institutions, workplaces, and homes.

Integrity Online & Offline: Personal and professional integrity must be maintained in digital spaces. Understanding cyber law equips citizens with the legal and technical knowledge required to safely expose and combat corruption online.

HIRI KOIARI YOUTH SHIFT FROM AWARENESS TO ACTION THROUGH ACTIVE CIVIC ENGAGEMENT PROGRAM



From May 8–10, 2026, youth representatives from the Hiri Koiari District participated in TIPNG's intensive three-day Active Civic Engagement (ACE) Program. Participants accomplished a major milestone: transitioning youth representation from symbolic title-holding into functional, action-oriented leadership.

Building a culture of integrity is a collective responsibility that starts with the individual. Through the ACE Program, we are empowering our youth to move beyond being spectators of governance to becoming active participants who drive accountability within themselves first, then in their communities.

Moving Beyond Theory to Local Solutions

The hands-on program challenged youth delegates from Hiri West, Hiri East, Vanapa Brown, and Koiari to analyze real-world community bottlenecks and design practical solutions. By the conclusion of the workshop, the delegates had developed concrete, community-level Action Plans ready for immediate implementation in their respective areas.

Through this immersive experience, these young changemakers built the practical skills required to:

- **Operationalize Integrity:** Translating principles of honesty and transparency into everyday standards for local community projects.
- **Practice Ethical Leadership:** Shifting focus from merely pointing out governance gaps to designing strategic responses that solve them.
- **Exercise Functional Representation:** Moving from being "well-informed" to "well-equipped"—gaining the exact tools needed to act decisively as genuine community advocates.

The Active Civic Engagement (ACE) Program is a TIPNG initiative aimed at strengthening governance at the grassroots level. By uniting young leaders across the four LLGs, the program reinforces their role as vital bridges between local youth and decision-making bodies. TIPNG commends the Hiri-Koiari youth delegates as they return to their communities with actionable plans to drive transparency, accountability, and positive change from the ground up!



ANTI-CORRUPTION HELP DESK EMPOWERS CITIZENS IN PORT MORESBY AND LAE

TIPNG carried out its first two free and confidential Legal Aid Clinics of 2026, delivering essential legal guidance and corruption-reporting channels directly to local communities. Supported by the PNG-Aus Partnership, these clinics enable TIPNG's Anti-Corruption Help Desk (AnCoHD) to reach citizens who frequently face barriers to justice, such as high legal costs, distance, and a lack of procedural awareness. These clinics are more than just legal advice sessions—they are a secure bridge for citizens to take meaningful action. Every report made is an act of leadership that strengthens the moral fabric of our nation.

Impact at a Glance

- **Port Moresby Clinic:** Recorded strong initial engagement, providing direct support to 11 clients and registering 15 formal complaints through the AnCoHD pathway.
- **Lae Clinic** saw a surge in community participation, with 31 clients accessing free legal support and 32 complaints lodged on-site.
- **Immediate Referral Action:** Partner integrity agencies attended to client concerns on the spot, guiding individuals through immediate, official recourse tailored to each agency's legal mandate.

TIPNG RE-ELECTED AS PNGRGC PRESIDENT

Civil Society Reaffirms Collective Leadership on Resource Governance

TIPNG has been unanimously re-elected as President of the Papua New Guinea Resource Governance Coalition (PNGRGC) Council for the 2026–2027 term. The unanimous vote signals continued confidence in the incumbent Council and reinforces the Coalition's role as the unified voice of civil society in Papua New Guinea's extractive sector.

The re-election took place during the Coalition's Annual General Meeting (AGM) on 30 June 2026, where member organizations from across the country gathered to evaluate past achievements, review governance and financial reports, and set strategic priorities for the sector. The ongoing work of the PNGRGC is proudly supported by the Australian Government through the Australia–Papua New Guinea Economic Partnership (APEP).

TIPNG Calls on National CSOs to Join PNGRGC

Reaffirming its mandate as PNGRGC President, TIPNG called on civil society organizations nationwide—across human rights, environmental, and financial sectors—to join the coalition to strengthen public oversight and ensure Papua New Guinea's natural resource wealth is managed transparently and responsibly.



ETHICS SESSION FOR WOMEN'S NETWORK

In this quarter, we facilitated an ethics session for the Advancing PNG Women Leaders Network, from across the country who were in Port Moresby for their AGM. Our session focused on the strategic power of influence and personal integrity. This session challenged participants to serve as the "standard and example" of ethical conduct within their respective roles of leadership, while actively mentoring peers to engage in national governance processes for long-term institutional stability.

By defining corruption directly as the "abuse of entrusted power for private gain," the session provided practical tools to identify subtle forms of misconduct, build institutional resilience, and resist pressure to compromise core values for short-term gains.

Key objectives of the ethics session was to:

- Raise awareness of the importance of personal and professional ethical conduct.
- Provide a forum to discuss common ethical dilemmas and practical mitigation strategies.
- Enable participants to integrate ethical reflection into their daily decision-making.
- Foster a culture of integrity, transparency, honesty, and accountability to strengthen communities and professional networks.

CCAC KICKS OFF VOTER AWARENESS TRAINING

The Community Coalition Against Corruption (CCAC)—in partnership with the Advancing PNG: Women Leaders Network (APNGWLN)—hosted its first Voter Awareness Workshop in Port Moresby in April, 2026.

The one-day training was conducted with over 30 dynamic women leaders from across the APNGWLN network. Designed as a "train-the-trainer" initiative, the workshop focused on building practical capacity, ensuring that CCAC members and network partners are equipped to lead non-partisan civic and voter education across communities nationwide.

Facilitated with a focus on active participation, the workshop covered three areas vital to electoral literacy:

1. Understanding Elections & the Election Cycle: Unpacking the technical phases of the election process to help citizens navigate voter registration, polling, and post-election accountability.
2. Practical Voter Awareness Tools: Delivering hands-on exercises and communication strategies so leaders can effectively translate electoral concepts into accessible community awareness sessions.
3. Ethics in Leadership: Reinforcing the crucial link between voter choices, leadership integrity, and democratic governance—reminding citizens that an ethical nation begins with an ethical vote.

By empowering women leaders to serve as active conduits of voter information, the CCAC is ensuring that civic education moves beyond Port Moresby and reaches local communities

where voter education is needed most.

This initiative represents a key milestone in the CCAC's ongoing campaign to protect the integrity of the 2027 National General Election. When citizens are informed

2025 AGM PRESENTS UNQUALIFIED FINANCIALS & BOLD ANTI-CORRUPTION MILESTONES

On Saturday, 30th May 2026, TIPNG convened its Annual General Meeting (AGM) in Port Moresby, presenting its audited 2025 financial statements alongside major operational achievements.

The year 2025 demanded that we raise our voice louder, push deeper into policy spaces, and continue to defend the democratic rights of ordinary Papua New Guineans.

2025 Strategic Milestones

During the AGM, TIPNG presented an unqualified financial report alongside a summary of its key national interventions from the past year.

- **Policy** - In policy spaces, the organization demonstrated strong national leadership by co-hosting Papua New Guinea's historic first Anti-Money Laundering Conference and partnering with the Department of Information and Communications Technology (DICT) to finalize the National Right to Information (RTI) Policy. Furthermore, TIPNG actively championed the democratic rights of citizens by demanding genuine civil society inclusion within the official Government-CSO Partnerships Policy.
- **Community & Youth Outreach** - Beyond national policy reform, TIPNG significantly expanded its community and youth outreach. We strengthened local accountability by scaling up the Community Coalition Against Corruption (CCAC) network ahead of upcoming elections, expanding the Youth Against Corruption Association (YACA), and fully restoring our confidential Anti-Corruption Help Desk (AnCoHD) to serve everyday citizens.
- **School Based Civic Education** - To secure long-term, generational impact, TIPNG also formalized a landmark partnership with the National Department of Education to roll out a nationwide school-based civic education curriculum.

TIPNG's 2025 Annual Report, themed "Integrity & Action Now!," details the organization's strategic efforts to combat corruption amidst a year of significant national challenges. The report highlights key achievements, including successful advocacy campaigns as well as a focus on strengthening partnerships and empowering youth through key programs. It is a testament to the unwavering support of TIPNG's financial members and a call for collective action for a more transparent PNG.

EMPOWERING WOMEN IN CORPORATE GOVERNANCE AND COMMUNICATIONS

Strengthening governance in Papua New Guinea requires empowering ethical leaders across all sectors. A central part of this mission is supporting women to take active, courageous roles in corporate governance and strategic communications. Continuing our long-standing partnership with the PNG Business Coalition for Women (BCFW), we delivered two key sessions for participants of the Senior Executive Women's Program (Cohort 21), focusing on ethical leadership and high-impact communication.

Corporate Governance

Opening TIPNG's engagement with Cohort 21, TIPNG Board Chairman Mr. Peter Aitsi addressed the cohort on how governance, ethical leadership, and accountability shape a stronger future for PNG's private and public sectors.

Building on the momentum of previous cohorts, Mr. Aitsi explored how systemic corruption and weak institutional governance disproportionately limit opportunities for women leaders. He emphasized that women in executive positions play a pivotal role in disrupting these barriers by embedding transparency into corporate culture.

Participants were challenged to lead by example, mentor emerging female professionals, and leverage their executive influence to champion organizational integrity and nation-building.

Strategic Communication Skills

Complementing the governance session, TIPNG Deputy Director – Communications, Ms. Yvonne Ngutlick, facilitated a session on Communications. The session focused on the principle that effective communication is not merely a function of position, but a direct reflection of leadership values.

LUNCH WITH LEGENDS AT STEAMSHIPS

Continuing our strategic engagement with the private sector, our CEO Ms. Arianne Kassman and Board Chair Mr. Peter Aitsi recently had the privilege of joining corporate leaders for Steamships Limited's "Lunch with Legends" series. Moderated by Ms. Hane Toua (Community Engagement & CSR Manager at Steamships), this conversational interview provided an honest and constructive look at the governance and ethical leadership required to shape the future of Papua New Guinea.

Our leadership shared their lived realities of anti-corruption work and the critical role of the business community. The dialogue explored three key areas:

- **Corruption at All Levels** - looked at how corruption manifests from high-level institutions to everyday actions, and the leadership required to shift both the reality and the global perception of PNG.
- **Impact on the Ground:** Highlighting the tangible impact of TIPNG's core programs, the institutional hurdles we navigate, and the community-led initiatives driving meaningful progress toward transparency.
- **Strengthening Corporate Governance:** Discussing how businesses can move beyond traditional corporate social responsibility to practically strengthen internal governance, mitigate corruption risks, and build national trust.

HOLDING POWER TO ACCOUNT

TIPNG, CIVICUS and PIANGO Submit joint UN Human Rights Report

In April 2026, we joined forces with regional and global civil society partners—the Pacific Islands Association of Non-Governmental Organisations (PIANGO) and CIVICUS—to submit a joint report to the United Nations Universal Periodic Review (UPR).

This submission provides a critical, independent assessment of the Papua New Guinea Government's progress in protecting fundamental citizen rights, press freedoms, and civic space.

The Reality Behind the Recommendations

During Papua New Guinea's 3rd UPR cycle in 2021, the PNG Government supported four key recommendations to protect and expand civil society space. However, our comprehensive evaluation of legal frameworks and human rights documentation shows that these commitments have only been partially implemented.

Most notably, PNG has failed to establish an independent National Human Rights Institution—despite receiving nine explicit recommendations from UN member states to do so during the last review.

As a direct result of ongoing restrictions, Papua New Guinea's civic space is currently classified as "Obstructed" by the CIVICUS Monitor.

Our Call

Real progress requires more than international pledges—it demands concrete domestic action.

TIPNG and its partners urge the National Government to move beyond empty promises and immediately:

- Enact a robust Right to Information (RTI) Law to guarantee public access to government-held information.
- Establish an independent National Human Rights Institution in full compliance with international standards.
- Repeal sections of the Cybercrime Act that are used to suppress free speech and silence critical voices.

5 Critical Threats to PNG's Democracy

Our joint report highlights five major areas where fundamental freedoms are actively under threat:

No Right to Information (RTI) Law: Over two decades of delays in passing the Right to Information legislation continue to sustain a culture of official secrecy and undermine public accountability.

Misuse of the Cybercrime Code Act: Provisions of the Act are increasingly weaponized to criminalize online expression, harass citizens, and arrest free-speech advocates.

Escalating Attacks on Media Freedom: Journalists face growing threats, job dismissals, and political pressure, amplified by concerns surrounding the 2025 Media Policy.

Targeting of Human Rights Defenders: Anti-corruption and civil society organizations—including groups like ACT NOW!—face arbitrary legal intimidation for carrying out their legitimate work.

Suppression of Peaceful Assembly: Authorities continue to block peaceful protests, accompanied by a concerning lack of police accountability for unlawful force.

REPORT REVEALS CIVIC SPACE UNDER PRESSURE

Following the release of the EU System for an Enabling Environment (SEE) 2025 PNG Country Focus Report, we are calling for immediate government action. The report reveals that PNG's civic space remains fragile and under growing pressure, characterized by a lack of transparency and limited citizen influence on policy decisions.

Equal participation is a prerequisite for a healthy democracy and nation building is a shared responsibility. "However, the assessment shows that consultation without impact is not meaningful engagement.

Key Findings of the 2025 SEE Report

- **Fragile Environment:** PNG's civic space scored between 1.8 and 3 across key principles, indicating a partially enabling but vulnerable environment for civil society.
- **Lowest Score for Openness:** The principle of Open and Responsive State recorded the lowest score, highlighting that public consultations often serve as symbolic requirements rather than meaningful dialogue.

- **Enforcing Protections:** Move beyond written laws to actively enforce fundamental freedoms of expression, assembly, and association.
- **Passing the Right to Information (RTI) Legislation:** Enact a robust RTI law to ensure citizens can access public data and hold institutions accountable.
- **Ensuring real participation:** Establish clear, transparent feedback mechanisms so civil society input directly shapes national policy decisions.

The 2025 PNG Country Focus Report is part of a global monitoring initiative supported by the European Union tracking civil society environments across 86 countries, with TIPNG serving as the national partner for Papua New Guinea.

WALK AGAINST CORRUPTION CHAMPIONS INTEGRITY

Change begins when citizens choose to do what is right, building a Papua New Guinea where transparency is normal, public office is a service, and integrity is the heartbeat of our democracy. This was the resounding message at the 16th annual Sir Anthony Siaguru Walk Against Corruption (SASWAC).

One hundred and ninety team (190) registered teams—comprising corporate entities, schools, civil society organizations, government agencies, SMEs, and families—came together in a peaceful display of solidarity. Held under the theme Integrity & Action Now!, the Walk Against Corruption challenged every citizen to shift from passive frustration to active citizenship, using personal integrity to disrupt systems of corruption.

Leading the walk alongside TIPNG were key representatives from across society: Mr. Danny Robinson (CEO, Credit Bank) for the business sector, Ms. Jacqui Joseph (CEO, Equal Playing Field) for civil society, and Mr. Steven Matainaho (Secretary, Department of Information and Communication Technology) for the public sector.

Key Highlights

- **Record Turnout & Diversity:** The event brought together 94 corporate and government agency teams, 44 school teams, 25 family teams, 20 civil society organizations, and 5 SMEs.
- **K200,000 Fundraising Goal Achieved:** The 16th Sir Anthony Siaguru Walk Against Corruption raised K208,000 that will directly support TIPNG's operations, ensuring its complete financial independence and sustainability.
- **Over 50 organizations and individuals** provided in-kind support towards the event.

As TIPNG's flagship civic platform, SASWAC continues to raise critical operational funds, deepen public awareness, and provide a safe space for citizens to stand shoulder-to-shoulder in saying no to corruption. All funds raised are audited and published openly in TIPNG's annual report.

RIGHT TO INFORMATION ADVOCACY

This quarter, we continued our advocacy for a robust Right to Information (RTI) law. Through strategic provincial forums, community workshops, and high-level technical partnerships, we engaged citizens on the vital role open information plays in public accountability. While access to information is guaranteed under Section 51 of the Constitution, Papua New Guinea still lacks the enabling legislation required for citizens to exercise this right effectively.

Provincial Outreach: Taking RTI to the Regions

CIMC Regional Development Forums (April 2026): TIPNG Partnerships & Policy Officer Mariah Bualia presented progress on the National RTI Policy at the Consultative Implementation & Monitoring Council (CIMC) Forums in Madang and Mt. Hagen. Framing the RTI Policy as a core pillar of the Reset@50 Agenda, TIPNG engaged public servants in the provinces, civil society leaders, and community members on shaping PNG's governance priorities for the next two decades.

Youth & Community Engagement: At Divine Word University in Madang during the CIMC Momase regional Forum, TIPNG operated an interactive information booth, educating students and partners on how to exercise their constitutional rights, demand transparency, and hold public institutions accountable.

FROM VALIDATION TO THE NATIONAL EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

RTI Policy Validation Workshop (June 11, 2026): Jointly led by the Department of Information and Communications Technology (DICT) and TIPNG at the Lamana Hotel in Port Moresby, this landmark event brought together key stakeholders from the Open Government Partnership (OGP) cluster to finalize the policy framework.

Technical Working Group (TWG) Final Consensus: Following the validation workshop, TIPNG convened with DICT, UNDP, and the OGP Secretariat for the final RTI TWG meeting. The group achieved a historic outcome: the final draft of the National RTI Policy, ready for submission to the National Executive Council (NEC). The TWG also established an RTI Legislative Development Workplan, creating a concrete roadmap to translate the policy into a comprehensive Act of Parliament.

TIPNG's RTI POSITION

As the policy moves toward legislative drafting, TIPNG remains steadfast in advocating for a robust Right to Information Act that guarantees three essential protections:

1. An Independent RTI Commission to oversee compliance, rather than an internal government unit.
2. Mandatory Proactive Disclosure requiring all state agencies to publish key public records routinely.
3. Clear Legal Limits on Secrecy, placing the burden of proof strictly on the government to justify any withholding of information.

TIPNG maintains that civil society must remain at the heart of the legislative drafting process to guarantee that Papua New Guinea's final RTI law serves the public interest and protects the citizens' right to know.

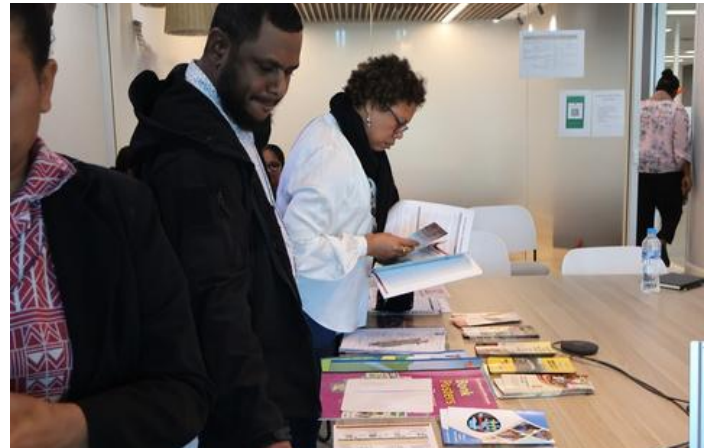
